

Whoever has achieved The divine gift of friendship, Let him join our chorus! Whoever knows the name of love, Let him join our chorus!


All creatures drink of joy At Nature's bounteous breast; Good and wicked alike Follow her rosy path.

By Robert Frost




Two roads diverged in a yellow wood, And sorry I could not travel both And be one traveler, long I stood And looked down one as far as I could To where it bent in the undergrowth;

Ten thousand saw I at a glance, Tossing their heads in sprightly dance.


The waves beside them danced; but they Out-did the sparkling waves in glee: A poet could not but be gay, In such a jocund company:



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
